Matt Newsome traces his involvement with UC San Diego to 1986, and the launch of his college experience as a Revelle student: “Some of the best times of my life.” More recently, he reconnected with the university through a lifelong friend who invited him to join the UC San Diego Alumni Board of Directors, where he’s served since 2008, and as its president from 2012 – 2014. He has served as a UC San Diego Foundation Trustee since 2012.

Later he was promoted to Program Manager and eventually Director of Product Marketing before accepting a transfer to become the United Kingdom Sales and Marketing Director for Cubic’s European headquarters near London.

After graduating with a B.S in Mechanical Engineering in 1991 and working at Cubic, in 1997 he earned his MBA from the University of San Diego. Reflecting on his years at UC San Diego, he states: “I learned how to learn here. I learned how to work. I learned how to make friends. I learned true relationships.” He is particularly appreciative of Ernie Mort, Dean of Revelle College while he was a student, exclaiming: “He’s been a real inspiration to me to come back to the campus and give back.”
